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2021 BCBSM LDA Youth Leadership Speech Contest

While this year's BCBSM LDA Youth Leadership Speech Contest looked a little different from previous years, one thing remained the same: the contestants delivered powerful, inspirational speeches about leadership.

On March 31, BCBSM LDA members gathered around their computers to watch the virtual contest. The contest was facilitated by Blue Cross personality, Dan D'Amico, Medicare Sales Consultant, Senior Health Services. This year, 13 students from southeast Michigan applied and qualified to compete.

Each contestant was given four to six minutes to address the audience on the topic of leadership. We saw some familiar faces from previous years, and plenty of new faces. During the contest, we heard personal stories, examples of leaders throughout history, student's own definitions of leadership, and samples of skills and personality traits that make a person a leader.

Once the last contestant finished, the judges were able to digitally submit their ballots and the scores were tallied by the ballot counters and the chief judge. While the ballots were counted, BCBSM LDA members had the privilege to hear from three talented orators.

The first two speakers were from the Michigan Humanities <u>Poetry Out Loud</u> competition. First runner-up in the Poetry Out Loud State Finals, Elaiyna Schwartzkopf, recited "The Properly Scholarly Attitude" by Adelaide Crapsey. The 2021 State Champion, Madison Ganzak, recited "Tarantulas on the Lifebuoy" by Thomas Lux.

The third speaker came from InsideOut's <u>Citywide Poets</u>. Ife Martin, a member of InsideOut's youth advisory board, performed her own poem, "Silence."

Chera Best, President of the Blue Cross Toastmasters club, led the audience in Table Topics. Volunteers were given one to two minutes to answer random questions chosen by Best.

Finally, the moment we had all been waiting for, D'Amico announced the winners. In third place, Shivangi Bhatt from Salem High School; in second place, Saket Kulkarni from Northville High School; and in first place, Jayanti Gupta from International Academy East. Gupta will advance to the National NMA Leadership Speech Contest for a chance to win the \$4,000 top prize.



Lessons learned from leading a great American Company

BCBSM LDA members were offered the opportunity to attend a lunch and learn with former CEO of General Electric Jeff Immelt, hosted by Steve Grigorian from the Detroit Economic Club.

Jeff explained how he started his employment selling plastics in the auto industry and became a CEO of GE. When he decided to leave GE he then wrote a book called "Hot Seat".

Jeff wrote the book because he wanted to tell a story of what went right and what went wrong while he was the CEO of the GE Company. When he took over the reigns it was difficult because he was replacing a person that everyone adored and considered the best manager of the century.



He tells the story of his first day at work, which was in September just after 911 and the ENRON scandal. The timing of his CEO position was challenging, to say the least, but forced Jeff to think outside the box to push the company to the next level. This taught him that even when times are rough, you need to keep showing up. In his book he also talked about how he had to learn to become more global through investing and hired leaders that would help trailblaze the company to the future.



Jeff's thoughts on the global economy:

The two biggest economies in the world are China and the United States. In the future he sees the two going towards a trade war. Jeff's advice for the U.S. is that we need to know how to compete in China, which he's teaching his students at Dartmouth University and Harvard University.



Jeff's book recommendation:
Military books are a great way to learn about leadership. They show you how to lead and how to manage during failure and how to apply strategies when the odds are stacked against you.

Lessons Learned from Aji Abraham's Leadership Journey

From his upbringing in central Pennsylvania, to an internship that he secured during a billiards game with a Pennsylvania congressman and his experience in the health insurance industry, Aji learned many lessons that have shaped his leadership style.

Always try to do the right thing. Even if doing the right thing doesn't help you make more money or win a trial, it will earn the trust of those around you.



Build and reinforce personal connections before you need them. You'll be much more successful when you need help in the future if you've already created and fostered relationships within your network. Make the time to meet new people and to reinforce relationships you've already created.

Seize opportunity when it presents itself. You never know where an opportunity will take you. Don't let it pass you by.

Listen first, learn about the situation, then speak. People want to feel heard and understood. Be humble enough to recognize that you don't know everything. Empower others to help you better understand the situation and find a solution together.

Focus on the quality of your work, not the quantity. "Don't hang onto the work, hang onto the work ethic."

Work to solve complex problems. Don't get too attached to work tasks, as they often get passed to someone else.

Accountability exceeds your authority. Everyone has a duty to speak up when something isn't right. Even if a problem is not assigned to you, you should always try to do the right thing. Speak up, and don't wait for someone else to fix it.

During his final remarks, Aji reflected on the opportunities he sees within the health care industry. He said, "competition is coming," and we need to be prepared to disrupt ourselves before others do it for us. Aji's role as the Vice President of Innovation and Market Solution will allow him to assist Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan in being a thought leader in Michigan and nationwide.
